

WINDOWS

Purpose

Polyplastic by Lippert cast acrylic windows (Roxite® Premium) have been designed for many years of problem-free use and offer you optimum sound and heat insulation. These cleaning instructions will help you achieve optimum use of your windows.

The information and tips in these operating instructions should answer the majority of your questions, however, if any remain unanswered, please contact your dealer.

Just like the other products in your vehicle, the windows require periodic maintenance and inspection. We recommend that you have your caravan inspected by your dealer at least once per year.

Cleaning Procedure

- Use copious amounts of water to rinse dirt from your window.
- Mix a solution of 80ml laundry detergent with warm water in a 5l bucket. Stir to completely mix the soap and water.
- Wipe the acrylic surface with a clean microfiber cloth that has been immersed in the bucket. Apply pressure to stubborn stains like grease or oil.
- Use a chamois leather or soft dry cloth to dry your acrylic windows.
- If the surface is static, use 'BURNUS' anti-static cleaner.

CAUTION

Do not use a sponge or dry cloth until the acrylic has been rinsed with water.

Under no circumstances should you use abrasive and corrosive substances such as: alcohol, turpentine, dry-cleaning naphtha, dishwasher detergents or solvents.

Do not use a high-pressure washer for cleaning your acrylic windows.

Never drive your caravan/camper through a carwash. The rotating bristles can cause scratches on the acrylic.

Maintenance

The acrylic windows should also be inspected during the annual service of your vehicle.

- For deeper scratches, please refer to your dealer or an appropriately certified specialist.
- Use talcum powder or another approved maintenance agent to keep the rubber in optimum condition.
- Hairline cracks in acrylic can occur if your window comes into contact with a non-approved cleaning agent. This will make the guarantee void.
- Do not use any agents containing silicones for maintaining the rubber.
